Oleksiy Sereda (born on December 25, 2005 in Mykolaiv) became a member of the national team in 2019. In the same year, at the World Championships in Gwangju, Korea, he came the 4th in the synchronised platform along with Oleg Serbin. In the individual

platform, he also showed the 4th result and won an Olympic licence to Tokyo. Sereda was the winner of the 2019 European Championships, which took place in Kyiv, becoming the youngest European champion in the platform. Also, in a pair with Oleg Serbin, he became the silver medallist in the synchronised platform.

Oleg Serbin (born on August 11, 2001 in Zaporizhia) showed the 6th result in addition to the listed achievements in doubles, at the 2019 European Championships in individual platform.

Sofia Lyskun (born on February 7, 2002 in Luhans'k) is a Master of Sports of Ukraine of International Class, the champion of Ukraine, Europe and the winner of the European Junior Championships (2017), the runner-up and bronze medallist of the III Youth Olympic Games (2018). European Champion (2018) in mixed doubles team competitions in the 3-metre springboard and the 10-metre platform, European Champion (2019) in platform, the bronze medallist of the European Championships (2019) in the synchronised platform.



Diving has long been popular in Kyiv. In the last quarter of the XIX century, it was mainly practiced on the Dnipro River and Matviyivska Bay (earlier names "Zaton Staryk" or "Staryk") located at the end of Trukhaniv Island with numerous aquatic centres and city beaches, equipped with diving platforms.

Kyiv Diving School raised a constellation of athletes, multiple champions of the Republic and the USSR, including Isaac Barkan, Ninel Krutova, Yevgeniya Bogdanovska, Georgiy Bilyi, Gennadiy Bezzabotnov, Yevgen Kholoptsev, Mark Polyakov. The founder of this school was Mykola Glushko.

Yevgen Kholoptsev worked at the aquatic stations of the Dnipro River, later becoming the Merited Coach of the USSR. His apprentices - Oleksandra Nekrasova, Anatoliy Kostrytsky, Leonid Fedorenko, Leonid Golub, Felix Samsonov, Lyudmyla Ivanova, Zynayida Vasylyuk, and many others - became the stars of Ukrainian diving, champions of the Republic and the USSR.

In the 1960s, Felix Samsonov, Mark Polyakov, Leonid Shylo, who moved from Lviv to Kyiv, as well as Viktor Khakhanov, Leonid Fedorenko, and others began their coaching careers.

Their apprentices Tetiana Stroganova, Tamara Sarkisova, Vadym Chaikin, Viktor Yatsenko, Vasyl Zamuruyev were the recognized leaders in diving not only in Ukraine but also in the USSR, successfully performing at the all-Union events, winning the most prestigious competitions - Championships and Cups of the USSR.

In the 1970s and 1980s, the number of diving coaches in the capital grew. The best coaches of Kyiv included Tamara Sarkisova, who trained the first World Junior Champion Viktor Palyga; Vanar Kuzmenko, and Mykhailo Ugryumov, who brought up the whole constellation of Masters of Sports of the USSR, and Masters of Sports of International Class. For their long work, these outstanding coaches were awarded the titles of Merited Coach of the UKrainian SSR and Merited Coach of the USSR.

The leaders of Ukrainian diving during this period were Igor Lobanov, Yuriy Artamonov, Najib Alyautdinov, Igor Yanko, Andriy Ignatenko, Oleksandr Yanishevsky, Lidiya Tytarenko, and of course, Zhanna Tsyrulnikova and Valeriy Statsenko, who won not only the republican, all-union and all-Union competitions but also represented their school in the international arena, winning the

In the beginning of the XXI century, diving suffered a severe decline in Kyiv: swimming pools and sports schools were closed; many coaches went to find work abroad.

The revival of diving in the capital of Ukraine began with puting into operation of a modern sports centre "LIKO", which housed Children's and Youth Sports Schools and created the necessary environment for training the national team. LIKO Sports Centre also became the home of the Kyiv Diving Federation headed by Volodymyr Volkovynskyi.

Today, the most titled apprentice of this diving school is the Merited Master of Sports of Ukraine Yuliya Prokopchuk - multiple winner of the European Championships (2006-2016), bronze (2013), and silver (2015) winner of the World Championships. Coaches of Yuliya Prokopchuk are Merited Coaches of Ukraine Andriy Rudenko and Nataliya Rudenko.





Swimming Pools in Kyiv


Aquatic sports developed on Trukhaniv Island in Kyiv with aquatic stations and temporary constructions as well as diving platforms at the amateur sports clubs "Dy-namo", "Spartak", "Vodnyk", "Burevisnyk" as well as city beaches. In the cold season, divers practiced in the Kyiv Palace of Physical Culture (abbreviated "DFK" from the "Dvorets Fizicheskoy Kultury"), which was located in the end of Sovetskaya Street (now - Fizkultury Street).

Remarkable is the history of creation of this building, which was erected as an exhibition pavilion of the All-Russian Trade and Industry Exhibition in 1913, to celebrate the 300th anniversary of the reign of the Romanov dynasty. The project of all the buildings of the Exhibition belonged to the famous architect of that time Vladislav Gorodetsky, who made a significant contribution to the formation of the image of Kyiv. Gorodetsky created the buildings of the National Art Museum of Ukraine, the National Ukrainian Drama Theatre named after Ivan Franko, the House of Organ and Chamber Music, the House of Chimeras, and many others.

In the Soviet times, the Palace of Physical Education housed a swimming pool with a diving platform, bleachers and tumbling practice gyms.

The building of the Palace of Physical Culture was demolished as having lost its relevance in 1975.

In 1967, during the next reconstruction of the sports complex "Dynamo" located in a picturesque area of Kyiv - The First of May Park (before the Revolution, here in the Tsar's Garden, was the Chateau de Fleur theatre (from the French "Castle of Flowers"),

between the colonnade of the entrance and the main arena, there was a swimming pool with two basins - for swimmers and for divers. Adjacent to the pool were two grandstands for 2,000 spectators.

It was an outdoor heated pool allowing the trainings to continue all-year-around. The swimming pool became the central place of aquatic sports in the Ukrainian capital.

The all-Union, European and world competitions were held at the "Dynamo" Kyiv swimming pool for 25 years. It was one of the most important centres for aquatic sports in Ukraine.

The largest outdoor swimming pool in the capital ceased to exist, the pool baths, platforms, and grandstands were eventually demolished in 1992.


A significant event in the life of Kyiv was the opening in 1954–1955 of an indoor swimming pool with a diving platform on the territory of the sports complex of the Kyiv Military District, better known as the SKA (Sportyvnyi Klub Armii) swimming pool, where diving sports clubs began to operate with the main goal of preparing qualified athletes. The pool was also a diving centre for students at the Institute of Physical Education.

The Combat Training Department of the Kyiv Military District in Kyiv formed the KVO Sports Club on April 1, 1957, in which talented coaches and athletes began to work, and outstanding divers came to perfect their mastership.

In the 1990s, after more than 30 years of successful operation, the swimming pool of the sports club of the Kyiv Military District was closed in need of major repairs. In 2005, the historic SKA swimming pool, and now the swimming pool of the Central Command of the Armed Forces of Ukraine, reopened its doors to diving enthusiasts and became the basis for Olympic training of the Ukrainian diving team.




Platforms and springboards for diving at the sports club of the Kyiv Military District

In the difficult 1990s, when the swimming pools of Kyiv began to close one after another, divers were relocated to the 50-metre pool of the Kyiv Order of Lenin Polytechnic Institute (today it is the National Technical University of Ukraine "Kyiv Polytechnic Institute named after Igor Sikorsky"), which was equipped with 1-, 3-, 5-, 7- and 10-metre platforms and a depth of 7.5 m.


The pool opened in 1983 became the training centre for both the leading divers of the capital of Ukraine and a place for training youth.


Ukrainian divers received a new powerful impetus when in September 2013 "LIKO-Holding", the main sponsor of the Ukrainian Diving Federation, constructed the "LIKO" sports centre, the only state-of-the-art diving complex in Ukraine, where the Ukrainian national diving team as well as the "workshop of the Ukrainian divers" the children's school "Triumph" were located.

The most state-of-the-art sports complex includes an Olympic-class swimming pool (50 x 25 m), with springboards (1 and 3 m), platforms (1, 3, 5, 7.5 and 10 m) and a hydraulic cushion, dry-land training equipment, a gym, recreation centre, and bleachers.

No wonder that in June 2017 and in August 2019, the European Diving Championships were held there, and in July 2018 - the World Junior Diving Championships.

The high-quality sports facilities available to both the children's school and the members of the Ukrainian National teams allow us to hope for a rapid increase in the level of skills of the Ukrainian divers.









Diving zone of the pool of the sports complex «LIKO»





Historical traditions, the availability of adequate sports facilities, and qualified personnel contributed to the formation of a powerful diving school in Kharkiv, which prepared many champions of the USSR, Europe, participants, and winners of the Games of the Olympiad.

The first most successful Kharkiv diver, who performed brilliantly in the 1950s, was Yuriy Stakhanov - Master of Sports of the USSR, a member of the national team of the Ukrainian SSR, multiple winner of national Championships.

The champion of the Republic Volodymyr Yefimov, who moved from Lviv, put great effort into the establishment of a diving school in Kharkiv.

However, the most titled diver of the Kharkiv region in the second half of the 1950s-1960s was an extremely talented athlete Mykola Naumenko.

Master of Sports of the USSR Mykola Naumenko was the first to win the Championships of the USSR in the platform. During the next decade, he repeatedly won the Championships of the Republic.

Another Kharkiv resident, Oleg Shelest won the Ukrainian Championships in the platform for the first time in 1956 and received the bronze medal in the 3-metre springboard. Master of Sports of the USSR Oleg Shelest was a multiple winner (in the platform) and the winner (in the springboard) of the Championships of the USSR.

In the 1970s, the greatest success was achieved by an apprentice of Mykola Naumenko, Master of Sports of the USSR Volodymyr Molchanov.


Following V. Molchanov in the late 1970s, talented divers I. Petrenko and T. Ustinov boldly made their way into the Youth and then into the National team of the Ukrainian SSR.

The winner of the European Cup was Master of Sports, Kharkiv resident Mykhailo Safonov.

In 1977, a specialized Children's and Youth Sports School in aquatic sports began operating in Kharkiv.

In 2013, the school was awarded the title of Yana Klochkova's Specialized Children's and Youth Sports School of the Olympic Reserve. Merited Coaches of Ukraine Tetiana Tolchanova and Volodymyr Molchanov brought up a constellation of outstanding divers there.

Oleksiy Prygorov, Merited Master of Sports of Ukraine, the European Junior Champion (2004), the European Champions Cup winner (2005), the bronze medallist of the XXIX Olympiad in Beijing (2008), the European champion (2009, 2010), became the most decorated modern athlete of the Kharkiv school. Today, Oleksiy Prygorov is one of the world's leading platform divers.





Pools in Kharkiv


In the pre-war period, Kharkiv residents used the "Dynamo" aquatic station equipped with a diving platform in Vasyshchev to hold training sessions and competitions in aquatic sports.

A remarkable event in the sports life of Kharkiv was the opening in 1964 of a swimming centre, which became the main attraction of the "Dynamo" sports complex beginning its history in 1931. The swimming centre had two pools: one - for swimming, the second - for water polo and diving with a 10-metre platform as well as a pavilion for dryland training and a grandstand for 2.5 thousand spectators.

The "Dynamo" pool in Kharkiv quickly affected the growth of the number of qualified divers.

For almost 30 years, the "Dynamo" swimming pool has been the centre of life for aquatic sports. After such extended usage, the facility needed major repairs, for the implementation of which there were not enough funds.

In 1992, "Dynamo" - the largest outdoor swimming pool in Kharkiv - ceased to exist. In 2008, the pool baths, grandstands, and platforms were demolished.

Palace of Aquatic sports of the "Spartak" Society in Kharkiv began its work as a sports training facility of all-Union significance in 1976.

Experts believe that the loss of the "Dynamo" swimming pool complex was the biggest failure of local authorities in the entire postwar period of the history of the Kharkiv "Dynamo" devision.


In 1976, the construction of the Palace of Aquatic sports was completed by the "Spartak" Society, which functioned as a sports training facility of all-Union significance. It had an Olympic-sized pool and diving platforms; the depth of the pool in the diving zone was 7 m.

Many international competitions took place in this facility during Soviet times; it also functioned as the centre for Olympic preparation. Today, after a partial reconstruction, the swimming pool has changed its name to a more modern one - "Aquarena"; it conducts classes in the platform with a maximum height of 10 m and a maximum depth of 6 m.


The Kharkiv "Pioneer" swimming pool was built in 1978. It was equipped with 3-, 5-, 7-metre platforms for diving. In the "Pioneer" pool, there is a Children's and Youth Sports School (today named after Yana Klochkova), where prominent coaches prepared dozens of leading athletes of Ukraine: Oleksiy Prygorov, Yegor Yakovenko, Alevtyna Korolyova, Sergiy Bondar, and others.

One of the founders of the Zaporizhia school of diving was Merited Coach of the USSR and the Ukrainian SSR Oleksandr Tkachenko, who returned to Zaporizhia, the city of his youth, after many years of fruitful coaching work in Lviv. His experience and knowledge became the basis of the victorious traditions of the Ukrainian diving: among his trainees were the 10-time USSR champion Inga Afonina (1986-1992), the first Ukrainian world champions Olena Zhupina and Svitlana Serbina (1998), the first Ukrainian Olympic medallists Olena Zhupina and Anna Sorokina (2000), the first Ukrainian multiple winners of the World Championships Roman Volod'kov and Anton Zakharov (2001, 2003).

Mykola Kapenkov, a graduate of Lviv, became the follower of O. Tkachenko. Over time, he was joined by his apprentice Master of Sports, a member of the National Team of the Ukrainian SSR Volodymyr Chumak. Among his best athletes was Tetiana Turova, now Merited Coach of Ukraine.

Divers began to train professionally in Zaporizhia only in the 1970s with the appearance of heated indoor swimming pools. Until then, they practiced on the Dnipro River mostly in warm weather.

The first wooden diving platform in Zaporizhia was installed on Lenin Island (now Sagaidachny Island). Subsequently, the platform was towed from the island to the Metallurg aquatic centre, and after reconstruction it was relocated to the Budivelnyk aquatic centre.


In winter, divers had to commute to the nearby Dnipropetrovsk every Saturday to compensate for the lack of swimming pools in their own town.

The 50-metre Slavutych swimming pool with a 10-metre platform and springboards for diving was finally built as part of the sports complex of the unique Motorobudivelnyk enterprise (now Motor Sich Company) in January 1972 in Zaporizhia with children's and youth diving sports schools on its premises.


Young professionals Yevgen Pishkurov and Igor Gulov, multiple champion of the USSR and Master of Sports Vyacheslav Malynovskyi by then moved to Zaporizhia. Coaches Volodymyr and Nataliya Tarasenko started training beginners. A new Zaporizhia school of diving emerged, where such two sports as gymnastics and diving were organically combined. The results came two years later, the Zaporizhia divers not only became a part of the National Team of Ukraine but also of the National Team of the Soviet Union.


The apprentices of the young coach Tetiana Turova progressed quickly. Among the first ones Master of Sports Svitlana Naumenko, among the first candidates for the Olympic team -Tetiana Gadun, who later became Master of Sports of the USSR of International Class, multiple winners of the USSR Championships, European and World Junior Champions.

Sergiy Gurylyov, an apprentice of Merited Coach of Ukraine Yevgen Pishkurov, Master of Sports of the USSR of International Class, winner of the Goodwill Games, multiple winner of the USSR Championships, multiple champion of Ukraine, are worthy of mention.







Master of Sports of Ukraine of International Class Iryna Pisareva, multiple champion of the USSR performed brilliantly in the 1990s. She was an apprentice of Merited Coaches of Ukraine Lyubov Barsukova and Oleksandr Barsukov.


Olena Zhupina, who became the champion of the USSR in 1991, was a serious contender to participate at the 1992 Games of the XXV Olympiad as part of the Unified CIS team. However, it was decided to send only one representative of Ukraine to the Games. It was a more experienced diver Inga Afonina, and the young Olena Zhupina and her coach T. Turova stayed at home.

The most titled of the Zaporizhia school of diving was an apprentice of Merited Coach of Ukraine Leonid Tolkachov - Inga Afonina - Master of Sports of Ukraine of International Class, the bronze medallist of the Goodwill Games (1990) in platform, the silver medallist of the European Championships (1989, 1991), a participant of the 1992 Games of the XXV Olympiad in Barcelona (5th place).

At the Games of the XXVI Olympiad in 1996 in Atlanta, Ukraine was represented by Olena Zhupina, who competed in both platform and springboard, taking 6th and 5th and places, respectively.

Olena Zhupina and Svitlana Serbina became the champions of the first synchronised diving 10-metre platform events at the World Championships in Perth (Australia) in 1998. Olena also received the gold medal in individual competitions.

In Sydney 2000, Olena Zhupina and Anna Sorokina won the first Olympic medals for the Ukrainian diving team.

Olena Zhupina became the most titled diver in Ukraine. She is a Merited Master of Sports of Ukraine, the bronze medallist of the European Championships (1993), the silver medallist of the Goodwill Games, a two-time world champion (1998), a two-time European champion (1992), the silver medallist (2002), a participant of three Games of Olympiads (1996, 2000, 2004), the bronze medallist (2000).

Olena Zhupina's reliable partner was an outstanding Zaporizhia diver, Merited Master of Sports of Ukraine Anna Sorokina. Together with Olena Zhupina, they won gold medals at the European Championships (1999) in synchronised springboard diving, bronze medals at the European Championships (2000), World Cups (1999, 2000), the Games of the XXVII Olympiad (2000), and the Goodwill Games (2000). Anna was a participant of two Games of Olympiads (2000, 2004).

Merited Master of Sports of Ukraine Roman Volod'kov and Anton Zakharov also achieved significant success in diving.



Their most successful apprentices were Roman Volod'kov, Anton Zakharov, the finalist of the 1996 Olympiad Iryna Pisareva and the bronze medallist of the European Championships in platform, the world champion (1998) in synchronised diving (together with Olena Zhupina), Merited Master of Sports of Ukraine.



Lviv

Post-war Lviv became one of the most fruitful for athletic activity areas of the Ukrainian SSR. The city was practically not damaged during the World War II, pre-war sports facilities have been preserved. In 1946, there were four outdoor and one indoor swimming pool in Lviv.

The leading professionals in the field of sports were sent from different parts of the country to work in Lviv in the 1950s. Among them were Aram Ter-Hovhannesyan (athletics), Vadym Andrievsky (fencing), Petro Sobenko (gymnastics), and others. Among them were the diving professionals Grygoriy Manchesko from Kyiv and Oleksandr Tkachenko from Zaporizhia.

It was O. Tkachenko who became the founder of the school of diving. Merited Masters of Sports of the USSR and Masters of Sports of International Class Roman Brener, Gennadiy Galkin, Oleg Melnykov, Tamara Sarkisova, Tetiana Shtyreva, Mykola Matkovsky, Fedir Volkov, Yaroslav Makogin graduated from this school.

Volodymyr Yefimov became the champion of the Ukrainian SSR in 1953 in platform and springboard. The champions at the Republican Championships in Odesa (1954) were Borys Zelmanovych and Galyna Vasylyshyna from Lviv in the 3-metre springboard; also, the prizewinners of the Championships were Vyacheslav Pinchuk and Olena Barayeva. Siblings Nadiya and Volodymyr Marynyaks became the prize-winners of the Ukrainian Championships (1956–1970), and Volodymyr Maryniak was also the silver medallist of the USSR Championships (1969) in platform.

For more than ten years (1956-1970), one of the leaders of the national team of the Ukrainian SSR was Merited Master of Sports of the USSR Oleg Melnykov, who later prepared a group of outstanding divers, for which he was awarded the high title of Merited Coach of the USSR.

Valeriy Sukhanov was leading at the national Championships in the 1970s.

Outstanding success in the 1980s was achieved by O. Tkachenko's apprentice Tetiana Shtyreva – the silver medallist of the World Championships (1975), the European junior champion (1975), a two-time USSR champion in springboard diving (1969, 1972), a participant of two Games of Olympiads (1972, 1976).

Mykola Matkovsky, a two-time bronze medallist of the European Cup (1973, 1975) and a three-time champion of the USSR (1973, 1975) performed brilliantly at the international and all-Union sports arenas.

Oleksandr Volynkin (1973) and Roman Kucher (1976) became prize-winners of the Cups of the USSR. The winners of the USSR Championships were Sergiy Galperin (1979) and Volodymyr Tkachov (1984, 1985).

Oleksandr Tkachenko, Sergiy Galperin, Roman Kucher, and Svitlana Shumna became multiple champions and prize-winners of the USSR Championships.

The winner of the European Cup (1995), the silver medallist (1997), a participant of the Games of the XXVI Olympiad in 1996 was Yaroslav Makogin.


After 1996, diving in Lviv experienced a significant decline. The restoration of traditions began only in 2014. The Lviv regional Diving Federation is currently headed by Oksana Vatseba.








Swimming Pools of Lviv


Due to historical, socio-political circumstances, some territories of Western Ukraine (Halychyna, Bukovina, Transcarpathia) developed under the influence of Austria-Hungary, Poland, Romania, and Czechoslovakia in the late nineteenth early XX century. In accordance with European trends in Western Ukraine, sports complexes, swimming pools, ice arenas, etc. were actively built.

One of the best sports centres of Western Ukraine, including the first aquatic sports facilities of the country, functioned successfully in Lviv. In particular, in 1933-1934, a large open-air pool complex "Iron Water" was built on the site of the ancient pond of Jan Kaminski thanks to a grant from the Labour Fund and the funds of the Lviv citizen Tadeusz Karasiński. Fresh, iron-rich water flowed through the treatment system to the pools from the Snopkivka and Rering springs and was renewed every 8-10 days.

The pool complex included a sports pool measuring 18 x 50 m, the depth of which was 1.70-2.20 m. This pool had seven swimming lanes, a springboard and specially equipped starting places, fenced off with a net. The diving board had three platforms of different heights - 1.5 m, 3.5 m and 5 m. In this part of the basin, the depth reached 4-5 m.

Since 1945, this complex belongs to the regional organisation of FST "Dynamo". Today, it includes five pools, one of which is outdoor, with a depth of






up to 8 m and a 10-metre diving platform. It was in this complex where the glory and pride of diving of Lviv region was formed.

Almost at the same time, another iconic facility opened in Lviv - the Zamarstyniv sports complex.


The Zamarstyniv outdoor swimming pool was built in 1934–1937, mainly with a grant from the Labor Fund and partly from the funds of the citizens of Lviv in the amount of about PLN 370,000. The pool project was designed by engineers Józef Mostowski and Jan Kowalski. The design of the swimming pool was made by engineer Tadeusz Karasiński. Construction works were carried out by Józef Mostowski. The installation of the water pumping station of the basin was performed in January 1935 by the company of Antoni Kunts.


The swimming pool was bottom lined with concrete slabs and consisted of shallow (75 x 60 m) and deep (50 x 25 m) parts. The depth near the springboard reached 5 m.

Four wells with a depth of up to 30 m were drilled near the beach. Their total productivity was approximately 43 m³/h. Special pumps connected to the well pumped water from them to the pool. The inflow of fresh water was approximately 1000 m3 per day; the water in the pool was renewed every eight days. As the inflow of fresh water for ten hours was 430 m³, it was enough to accommodate 2150 visitors.

Buildings in the vicinity of the pool, housed on their premises the management of the bathing establishment, changing rooms, showers and a restaurant.

After World War II, the pool was rebuilt and given a new name - educational and sports training facility "Spartak" (now completely demolished, a modern shopping and entertainment centre "Spartak" is being built on this site).

The postwar period, when Western Ukraine became part of the former Ukrainian SSR, two open water pools "Spartak" and "Dynamo" with platforms and springboards, as well as one indoor facility with 3-metre and two 1-metre springboards were active. Diving was cultivated in sports clubs "Dynamo", "Burevisnik", "Avangard"; relevant departments were opened in CYSS № 3 at the Lviv sports boarding school (now Lviv Professional College of Sports) and Lviv State Institute of Physical Culture (now Lviv State University named after Ivan Bobersky).

The selfless work of many coaches began to glorify Lviv and Ukraine bringing up a group of outstanding athletes, including Merited Master of Sports and Master of Sports of International Class. Among them are: Roman Brener, Gennadiy Galkin, Tetiana Shtyreva, Mykola Matkovsky, Fedir Volkov, Yaroslav Makogin. Multiple-time champions of Ukraine Sergiy Galperin, Roman Kucher, Svitlana Shumna.





Six coaches from Lviv were awarded the title of Merited Coach of Ukraine: Oleksandr Tkachenko, Leonid Shylo, Mykhailo Avramenko, Oleg Melnykov, Olena Barayeva and Yevgen Yatsyuk.

Diving in Lviv declined after 1996; the regional diving federation was suspended; the relevant sports facilities did not function until 2014.

At the end of 2013, with an active assistance of charity funds, the outdoor swimming pool of the Summer Sports Training Centre was reconstructed. In 2014, the Regional diving Federation resumed its activities. Thanks to the efforts of then the Head of the Department of Physical Culture and Sports of the Lviv Regional State Administration Yuriy Maiboroda and the Head of the Lviv Diving Federation Oleksandr Bublyk, a diving department was opened at the Yuriy Kutenko Lviv Junior High School.

Today, the sports school has four coaches: Merited Coach of Ukraine Oleg Melnykov, Dmytro Adamchuk, Ulyana Kaviychyk, O. Chaban and more than 50 young divers. In a short period of time, two champions of Ukraine among girls and boys were prepared: Vira Seredyak (2019) and Matviy Shlomyak (2020). The Army Sports Training centre has already hosted several official diving competitions. The department of diving has also opened on the basis of CYSS "Yantar" in Novoyavorivsk, where the only diving platform of the indoor pool "Start" operates in the Lviv region.



Dnipropetrovsk school of diving dates back to the 1920s, when enthusiasts of this sport mastered the stations on the Dnipro River.

Aquatic stations on the Monastery Island of Dnipropetrovsk were the venue for the training of divers, rowers, and water polo players in summer.

One of such aquatic centres - "Mashinostroitel", which is still the training facility of the Children's and Youth Athletic School of Olympic Reserve for swimming - was built in 1958.

Almost every aquatic centre on the Dnipro River was built on wooden platforms, which allowed hundreds of citizens to master this adventure sport. The diving classes began operating in the late 1950s in the 25-metre pool of the Dnipropetrovsk Industrial College. Well-known athletes, Masters of Sports of the USSR, champions and prize-winners of the USSR Volodymyr Mishyn, Volodymyr Asayev, Vyacheslav Pinchuk, Lyubov Asayeva, Galyna Pidkhalyuzina and others who had moved to Dnipropetrovsk from Lviv practiced there.

The spouses Felix Samsonov and Olena Zakuzenna moved to Kyiv from Dnipropetrovsk in 1959. During his years of work in Dnipropetrovsk, Felix Samsonov prepared dozens of Masters of Sports of the USSR. Among








For his fruitful work Felix Leonidovich Samsonov was awarded the title of Merited Coach of the USSR.

The apprentice of F. Samsonov, Candidate for Master of Sports, Merited Coach of Ukraine Leonid Kochenkov became the successor of the glorious traditions of the Dnipropetrovsk school of diving. His best athletes were Masters of Sports of the USSR Gennadiy Minov and Oleg Vyshyvanov, who were part of the national teams of the USSR, multiple-time champions and prizewinners of the USSR.

L. Kochenkov's apprentices, Masters of Sports V. Chernychenko, S. Savchuk, Nataliya Huk (Peleshuk), D. Ostapenko, T. Ulyanchenko, A. Nekhanovych, F. Oleksienko successfully performed at competitions of the Republican level.

In 1990s, a whole group of talented athletes was prepared by young coaches Oleg Vyshyvanov and Nataliya Dugina. Their athletes successfully performed at all-Union and Republican events. In 1991, Master of Sports of the USSR Larysa






The Children's and Youth Athletic School of Olympic Reserve began operating in 1970 with the opening of the Palace of Aquatic sports "Meteor". It was rightly considered one of the best in the USSR. Merited Coach of the RSFSR Vladimir Petrovich Abisov worked there for several years. He prepared the first diving Master of Sports of the USSR, the European and World Championships prize-winner Gennadiy Starodubtsev.

The Palace of Aquatic sports "Meteor" as part of the sports complex of the State Enterprise "Production Association Southern Machine-Building Plant named after O. Makarov" received the status of the National Training Centre of Olympic and Paralympic training in 2001.

Today, the City Complex has a Children's and Youth Athletic School of Olympic Reserve (with a diving department), and the Olympic Training Centre operates at the Palace of Aquatic sports "Meteor". Merited Coach of Ukraine Leonid Kochenkov is the Senior Coach of the team of Dnipropetrovsk region. His apprentice Yuriy Shlyakhov is the most titled diver of the Dnipropetrovsk region - Master of Sports of Ukraine of International Class, member of the national team of Ukraine (1998-2010), a multiple champion of Ukraine, a five-time champion of European







Championships, the winner of the European Synchronised Cup (2001, 2005), the bronze medallist of the World Universiade (2007, 2009), the bronze medallist of the European Championships, a participant of two Games of Olympiads (2004, 2008).


The team of coaches includes Master of Sports of the USSR Iryna Semernina (nee Fonaryova), Nataliya Peleshchuk, Andriy Bytsenko. In 2016, athletes of the Dnipropetrovsk school Mykyta Shumak and Sergiy Galychenko became the silver medallists of the Ukrainian Championships in synchronised diving from the 10-metre platform. Mykyta Shumak also became the champion of Ukraine in 2017 in synchronised platform together with Luhans'k athlete Mykyta Kryvopyshyn.

Yelyzaveta Lytvynenko (2015–2016), Sergiy Kuryanovych (2015–2016), Sergiy Galychenko (2015–2016) became the champions and prize-winners of the Ukrainian Championships in their age groups.

Today the development of diving in Dnipro is regulated by the Dnipropetrovsk region Non-Governmental Organisation Diving Federation and its President Oleg Vyshyvanov.


The diving department in Ordzhonikidze (now Pokrov) in the Dnipropetrovsk region was initiated in 1981 at the Dolphin swimming pool of the Ordzhonikidze Mining and Processing Plant. Its first diving coach was Oleksandr Yeriomin. Two years later, Valentyn Tochonykh joined the team. The two coaches prepared seven Masters of Sports of the USSR in seven years. The first Masters of Sports were Olena Patserina, Galyna Torchutkina, Tetiana Voloshko, Olga Bilozyorova.


After retiring from competitive diving in the 1990s, Olena Patserina and Olga Bilozyorova also began coaching. O. Patserina prepared four Masters of Sports of Ukraine; among them are Mykhailo Moskvychov, Yevgenia Lomakina, Lilia Kopylets, and Illya Patserin. From 2004 to 2015, Patserina was the Director of the Manganit Children's and Youth Sports School - the primary organisation of the trade union of metallurgists and miners of Ukraine Ordzhonikidze Mining and Processing Plant with a diving department. Today she is the Head Coach and an International Diving Judge.

Currently a team of five coaches - O. Merkulova, E. Patserina, O. Bilozyorova, A. Yanchenko, and V. Tkachenko - dedicate their time to preparing young divers. Athletes Mykhailo Moskvychov, Yevgeniya Lomakina, Liliya Kopylets, Illya Patserin, Oleksiy Rozdobudko, and Yegor Atroshchenko became the champions of Ukraine. The winners of the all-Ukrainian Competitions were Kateryna Seredych, Maria and Oleksandra Kolesnyks, Anastasiya Shevchuk, Anastasiya Trapeznikova, Nelli Chukanivska.

With the support of OMPP, additional training equipment was provided to aid the athletes of the National Team of Ukraine in preparation for the Olympic Games in 2012.

Today, the school is headed by Olga Merkulova. Olga Bilozyorova is the Senior Coach of the Diving Department at the Manganit Junior High School.







Mykolaiv

Picturesque nature and rich water resources of Mykolaiv enhanced the development of aquatic sports since the end of the XIX century.

In the first years of the Soviet rule before the World War II and in the first postwar years, Mykolaiv was not only a training centre for divers but also hosted many competitions of both National and all-Union importance.

This city gave a start to many prominent Ukrainian athletes, among them were the famous Grygoriy Manchesko and Oleksandra Nekrasova.


Thousands of girls and boys were involved in swimming, diving, rowing, and water polo at the city's Children's and Youth Sports Schools in the 1950s.

During the 1960s and 1990s, diving as a competitive sport did not develop, due to the lack of swimming pools equipped for diving in the city.

The new history of diving commenced in 1997, when a new sports complex "Aquarius" hospitably opened its doors to visitors. The initiator of the opening of the diving classes was the director of the complex P. Plotnikov, who also began his coaching career there. Among his first successful apprentices is a Merited Master of Sports of Ukraine Olena Fedorova.

The Children's and Youth Sports School "Ukraine", which included diving, swimming, and synchronised swimming was opened in Mykolaiv in 1997. It currently prepares a reserve for the national teams of Ukraine. The practice is currently carried out at the sports complex of the "Aquarius" swimming pools.





Over the years, the school has prepared three Merited Masters of Sports of Ukraine, six Masters of Sports of Ukraine of International Class, 48 Masters of Sports of Ukraine in diving.

The most famous athletes of the Mykolaiv school of diving are the bronze prize-winner of the Olympics Illya Kvasha and the youngest European champion Oleksiy Sereda, Merited Masters of Sports of Ukraine Khrystyna Ishchenko, Olena Fedorova, and Oleg Kolodiy, Masters of Sports of Ukraine of the International Class Kostiantyn Milyaev, Alevtyna Korolyova.

Illya Kvasha is a Merited Master of Sports of Ukraine, bronze medallist of the 2008 Games of the XXIX Olympiad in synchronised diving with Oleksiy Prygorov, a two-time silver (2006, 2013) and bronze (2017) prize-winner of the World Championships, a nine-time European champion, 2009 (2), 2010 (2), 2012, 2013, 2016, 2017), a five-time silver medallist (2008, 2011, 2015, 2017 (2)), a two-time bronze medallist (2012, 2015)), a 40-time champion of Ukraine.

Oleg Kolodiy is a Merited Master of Sports of Ukraine, the European champion in team competitions (2018), the bronze medallist of the World Championships (2017), a two-time silver (2017, 2019) and a three-time bronze (2013, 2015, 2017) prize-winner of the European Championships, a multiple-time winner of the Ukrainian Championships.

Khrystyna Ishchenko is a Merited Master of Sports of Ukraine, a multiple European Champion and the World Junior Champion, the bronze medallist of the World Championships (2005), the bronze medallist of the European Championships (2004-2006), 15-time champion of Ukraine.







Mariupol

In 1970 in Zhdanov (now Mariupol), the department of diving began operating simultaneously with the opening of the "Neptune" swimming pool. The first coach in Zhdanov was the legendary Mstyslav Pasevyev, who prepared the first Master of Sports, the winner of the Championships of the Ukrainian SSR Ivan Lima and the winner of the Championships of the Republic, winner of the USSR Championships Tetiana Syrotenko.

Tamara Parkhomenko, who worked along with M. Pasevyev, prepared the silver medallist of the USSR Championships Alla Zamkova and the winner of the Ukrainian SSR Championships Inga Zaginey.

All three talented Ukrainian divers - Tetiana Syrotenko, Alla Zamkova and Inga Zaginey - died tragically in 1977 as a result of a plane crash near Zhdanov.

A team of coaches Y. Putigin, K. Melnyk, and acrobatics coach A. Ovsyannikov started working in 1972. In the following years, they managed to prepare the winner of the USSR Cup (1980), the winner of the "Friendship" tournament of the socialist countries (1978), multiple champion of Ukraine (1977-1981), winner of the USSR Championships (1982-1983) Master of Sports of International Class Igor Koshman.

The coaching team consisting of the Master of Sports of the International Class Yuriy Artamonov and Anatoliy Reznichenko worked quite successfully to train the silver medallist of the USSR Championships (1987) Oksana Barneva, the winner of

the USSR Youth Championships Alina Lysova, the silver medallist of the European Championships Oleg Andriyuk. Y. Artamonov's student, 14-year-old Ukrainian diver Oleg Andriyuk, became the first in the world to dive four and a half turns from a platform in 1986 at the USSR Championships. Only in the following year, a dive of such difficulty was repeated in the international arena - at the Junior World Championships Norway by a Chinese athlete Wu Feilong.

Today, Oleg Andriyuk works as one of the coaches of the US National Diving Team.

No less interesting was the professional career of his coach Yuriy Artamonov, who, at the age of 47, became the first Ukrainian coach to train the Olympic champion from Greece, Nikolaos Siranidis.

Y. Artamonov moved to Greece at the invitation from the local Swimming Federation in the 1990s. He was entrusted to prepare the Greek divers for the 2004 Games of the XXVIII Olympiad in Athens.

Artamonov's apprentices - the 27-year-old Nikolaos Siranidis and Thomas Bimis - won the synchronised springboard diving event, beating the world's best divers - the Australians, the Chinese, the Americans, and the Russians (among whom were the legendary Dmitry Sautin and Aleksandr Dobroskok).







Twenty-seven years passed since Yuriy Artamonov had first come to the Mariupol swimming pool "Neptune" until he stood at the Olympic swimming pool in Athens as the coach of the Olympic champions.

In 1990, the hard work of the Mariupol coaches and athletes allowed a number of divers to become participants in the Olympiad as part of the national team of the independent Ukraine. Among them were Maksym Lapin (Atlanta, 1996), Eduard Safonov and Dmytro Lysenko (Sydney, 2000), Dmytro Lysenko (Athens, 2004; Beijing, 2008).

Participant of three Games of Olympiads (2000, 2004, 2008) Dmytro Lysenko is a Master of Sports of International Class, a 12-time champion of Ukraine, the winner of the European Youth Championships (1995, 1999), the European champion in synchronised diving (2001), the winner of the Grand Prix in New Zealand (2000), the bronze medallist of the World Universiade (2007), the bronze medallist of the European Championships (2004).

Athletes of Merited Coach of Ukraine Anatoliy Golovan - Mark Chichilov, Olga Bochkareva, Master of Sports Yevgen Kravtsov, Yuliya Volosova, Stanislav Oliferchyk, Mykyta Tkachov - successfully performed in the international arena, becoming the winners and prize-winners of the Championships of Ukraine.





Luhans'k

The first aquatic centre with facilities for diving was located on the banks of the Luhan River, right tributary of the Siversky Donets River (Don's basin). Diving was traditionally perceived as mere entertainment on water and not as a competitive sport.

Sports facilities began to appear in Luhans'k (then Voroshylovgrad) only during the recovery after the World War II. The first 50-metre outdoor swimming pool with diving platforms and grandstands for spectators was built in the early 1950s. In 1954, all-Union competitions were already held in this basin. The swimming pool became a training centre for athletes in aquatic sports.

The next breakthrough in the city's sports life was the opening of a 50-metre heated indoor pool. After three years of construction, the "Youth" sports complex was put into operation on November 3, 1968. The capacity of the pool was up to 1,000 people a day; there were swimmers, divers, water polo players, and pentathletes of Luhans'k region. There were several platforms of 3, 5, 7 and 10 m, two springboards - 1 and 3 m. The depth of the pool in the dive zone was 5.5 m. That is, all conditions were created for the high-quality diving practice.

The "Spartak" swimming pool was built in the 1980s; it was equipped with a platform for diving. The depth of the pool was 3.5 m, which allowed to conduct classes for children.

In the 1990s, the first significant success appeared - Oleksandr Skrypnyk and Olga Leonova as part of the national team of Ukraine became participants of the Games of the Olympiad.




Ganna Krasnoshlyk is a Master of Sports of Ukraine of International Class, the silver medallist of the Youth Olympic Games 2014 in Nanjing, the silver medallist of the European Championships (2016), a multiple-time winner and prize-winner of the Ukrainian Championships, a participant of the 2016 Games of the XXXI Olympiad in Rio de Janeiro.

Oleg Kolodiy is a Merited Master of Sports of Ukraine, the bronze medallist of the World Championships (2017), a two-time bronze medallist of the European Championships (2013, 2015), a multiple winner of the Ukrainian Championships.

Sofia Lyskun is a Master of Sports of Ukraine of International Class, the champion of Ukraine (2016), a multiple winner, the bronze medallist of the European Junior Championships (2016), the silver and bronze medallist of the 2018 Youth Olympic Games in Buenos Aires.

Viktoriya Safonova is a Master of Sports of Ukraine, a winner (2015) and prize-winner of the Ukrainian Championships.

Illya Trushin is a Master of Sports of Ukraine, the champion of Ukraine (2016), a finalist of the European Junior Championships (2016).

Vlada Tatsenko is a Master of Sports of Ukraine of International Class, a multiple winner of the Ukrainian Championships, the silver medallist of the European Championships (2016).

Mykyta Kryvopyshyn is a Master of Sports of Ukraine, a multiple-time champion of Ukraine (2016 2017, 2019)

Oleksiy Sereda - is a Master of Sports of Ukraine, the champion of Ukraine (2018), the bronze medallist of the Grand Prix of the International Swimming Federation (2019).

Valeriya Lyulko is a Master of Sports of Ukraine, the winner (2017) and a multiple-time prize-winner of the Ukrainian Championships.

Maria Sereda is the champion of Ukraine in the 10-metre platform (2019).

A large list of young Masters of Sports of Ukraine, who have achieved success both nationally and internationally, gives reason to hope for future fruitful performances of Luhans'k divers on the Olympic arena.

Tamara Tokmachova, Merited Coach of Ukraine, the Head Coach of the Ukrainian diving team (from 2005 to the present), who raised a constellation of Merited Master of Sports and Master of Sports of Ukraine of International Class, also began her professional career in Luhans'k.

Today, Luhans'k divers train in the recently reconstructed swimming pool of the Yunost sports complex, where a Children's and Youth Sports Schools also operate.

Two Merited Coaches of Ukraine - Larysa Afanasyeva and Olga Ivanenko prepare the youth of Luhans'k in diving.

The development of diving in the Luhans'k region is managed by the region Non-Governmental Organisation Diving Federation, whose President is the Master of Sports of the USSR Stanislav Koshovyi.






Odesa


The all-Ukrainian aquatic station was opened in Odesa on the site of the ruins of the pre-revolutionary Catherine Yacht Club in 1931. The all-Ukrainian aquatic station consisted of three departments: rowing, swimming and diving, and sailing. The swimming and diving school was equipped with two training rafts, a 10-metre diving platform, high and low springboards. The Head Coach of the swimming and diving school was T. Chernov from Leningrad. To perform his duties, he worked from morning till late-night.

Two-month training courses were held for physical education instructors of Ukraine of up to 50 people in a group at the all-Ukrainian Aquatic station in Odesa!

Another aquatic centre with a diving platform was built on the Platonovsky Pier. It was very popular among the people of Odesa.

Another place for diving in Odesa was the Dukivsky Garden - a 25-hectare park on the slope of the Water Beam, which opened in 1810. It was there that then mayor of Odesa, Duke de Richelieu, arranged his country residence, hence the name of the garden. Platforms for diving were installed on a beautiful lake.






The garden was reborn in 1949; after reconstruction, it was named the Victory Park. In the late 1950s, the park became a sports and entertainment centre with a 50-metre pool and a 10-metre diving platform with small stands for spectators. In the late 1970s, its popularity began to decline; and in 1989, the Victory Park was transferred to self-financing.


A sports complex of the Odesa Military District (the so-called SKA) was put into operation in 1952. It included a 25-metre pool with 5- and 10-metre platforms for diving as well as 1-metre and 3-metre springboards. In 1966, the pool was reconstructed.

In 1977, the pool of the Odesa Air Defence Plant was opened with a 5-metre platform, two 3-metre and three 1-metre springboards.


Ukrainian coaches Leonid Olensky, Oleksandr Zuyev, Volodymyr Reznichenko, Valeriy Martynovsky coached in these facilities at different times. Among their apprentices were Valeriy Martynovsky, Oleksandr Alpatikov, Viktor Lytvynov, Tetiana Lakhmanyuk, Nina Manokhina, Tetiana Stepanova, Volodymyr Alekseychuk (Champion of the USSR School Games).

Athletes Iryna Kuzyk and Olga Dumyk became the winners of the all-Union competitions in the springboard in 1987 (for the prize of «Komsomolskaya Pravda» newspaper).

Coaches Valeriy Martynovsky, Leonid Sukach, Volodymyr Kryuchkovsky, Lyudmyla Khilova, Iryna Kuznetsova made their contribution to the diving department of the "Storm" sports complex in Odesa in the 1980s. Their athletes performed successfully at the all-Ukrainian competitions.

Odesa was the venue for many all-Union, all-Ukrainian, and International competitions.

Swimming pools in Odesa fell into disrepair in the 1990s; there were not enough funds to maintain the Children's and Youth Sports School, so it ceased to exist.

Today, diving in Odesa is not cultivated.



Vinnytsia

The bays of the Southern Bug were a training place for athletes, children, and youth of the Vinnytsia region. Classes in rowing, swimming, and diving were held at the aquatic centres.

Young people practiced their skills on especially equipped diving platforms, preparing to pass the TRP standards under the guidance of amateur coaches in the 1930s. The mass involvement with aquatic open water sports in the USSR did not bypass the Vinnytsia region as sports clubs started to emerge and grow here.

Leonid Hoffman, who prepared a constellation of Masters of Sports of the USSR, stood at the origins of the development of diving in Vinnytsia. Among them were Svitlana Arbuzova, Yuliya Oleksienko, Petro Ivaskevych, and others.

A significant contribution to the development of diving in Vinnytsia in the 1970s was made by Coach Valentyna Pavlova, whose athletes - Oleksandr Babayev, Olena Sologub, Olena Derun, and others were among the leaders of this sport in the country. Olena Derun successfully performed at the all-Union and international arena competitions. She was a multiple winner of the USSR Championships and a member of the USSR national team in diving.

In the 1980s and 1990s, there were 11 diving coaches at the Vinnytsia Children's and Youth Sports School. The leading coach at that time was Borys Rosenberg. Among his best athletes were Volodymyr Rozbytskyi, a finalist of the all-Union competitions (USSR Cup and Spartakiad of the Peoples of the USSR, all-Union Youth Games (1985),

Lyudmyla Chovgun, and Lyudmyla Ovcharuk, members of the Ukrainian SSR team who successfully competed in the European Youth Championships. The greatest success among Borys Rosenberg's apprentices was achieved by his son Pavlo Rosenberg, a multiple winner of the European and World Youth Championships and a winner of the World Cup (2007). Pavlo Rosenberg took the 5th place in the 3-metre springboard at the Games of the XXI Olympiad in Beijing as a member of the team of Germany.

Ivan Ivaskevych, a coach and an apprentice of the Vinnytsia diving school, worked extremely successfully. Among his best apprentices, Master of Sports of International Class, the winner of the USSR Championships, Olena Savchuk is especially notable.

At the Spartakiad of the USSR, two representatives of the Vinnytsia region- Olena Savchuk and Volodymyr Rozbytskyi - took the first places.

After a certain decline in the 1990s due to economic reasons, which led to the departure of coaches abroad and poor training conditions, the situation in Vinnytsia diving gradually began to stabilize by the year 2000. Today, the department of diving at the sports school "Orbita" on the basis of sports club "Avangard" operates successfully.

The Senior Coach of the department is the Merited Coach of Ukraine, the coach of the highest category Diana Kulberi, who prepared a group of talented Ukrainian divers. The most famous among them is Merited Master of Sports of Ukraine Anna Pysmenska, a champion of Ukraine, a winner of the European Championships, a participant and finalist of the Games of Olympiad of 2008 and 2012.

The development of sports is supervised by the Vinnytsia region Non-Governmental Organisation Diving Federation headed by Valeriy Rozbytskyi.
